Background Paper

In the framework of a European network of research institutes granted by the EU programme COST,¹ a project was launched for four years in order to conduct research on the overall topic of "New challenges of peacekeeping and the European Union's Role in multilateral crisis management". Given the growing importance of multilateral peacekeeping missions around the world, this project aims to encourage new research and an exchange on the topic by pooling knowledge and networking to pave the way to the elaboration of a vision on the EU role on peace operations. Inspired by the UN Capstone Doctrine, which sets out the guiding principles and core objectives of UN Peace Operations in the 21st century, exchanges were stimulated among researchers on how, why, when and with whom the European Union (EU) should envisage common peacekeeping and peace building missions.

After using the COST tools (seminars and conferences, training-schools, researcher exchanges) for conducting research in five areas (EU relations with other International Organizations; identification of evaluation criteria for comparative approach in the study of European missions; local dimension; exit strategy; gender), researchers were undertaking short term scientific missions (STSMs). These STSMs are exchange visits aimed at strengthening networks by allowing researchers to go to an institution in another country member of the Action to foster collaboration in the area of peace missions and crisis management.

As a conclusion of this project, a final action conference will be held at the Austrian National Defence Academy in Vienna (21 March 2013). During this conference, results and outcome of the various research phases will be presented. They will cover the development so far as well as findings and recommendations for the future EU's role. Presenting the final publication will be an eminent part.

Additional to that, the conference partners (COST, Institute for Peace Support and Conflict Management/Austrian National Defence Academy, Austrian Institute for International Affairs) will organize two topical panels and a special lecture to give the conference an academic and political framework.
