Generalmajor Dipl.-Paed. Heinrich Brauss (Deutschland) ist Offizier der Bundeswehr und seit 1972 Soldat. Er studierte an der Universität der Bundeswehr in München Erziehungswissenschaften und Neuere Geschichte. B. absolvierte den Generalstabslehrgang des Heeres an der Führungsakademie der Bundeswehr in Hamburg. Von 2001 bis 2003 kommandierte B. die Panzerbrigade 42 BRANDENBURG in Potsdam. Von Juni bis Dezember 2002 war er als *Chief of Staff* im *Headquarters* Stabilisation Force (SFOR) in Sarajewo/Camp Butmir eingesetzt. B. absolvierte den Generalstabslehrgang des Heeres an der Führungsakademie der Bundeswehr in Hamburg. B. war unter anderem in Sarajewo/Railovac (GECONSFOR) und in Tetovo/Prizren (KFOR) eingesetzt. Der Verwendung als Kommandeur eines Artilleriebataillons von 2001 bis 2002 schlossen sich solche als Grundsatzreferent Militärpolitik im Bundesministerium der Verteidigung in Berlin und als nationaler Experte für die EU Operation ALTHEA im Ratssekretariat der Europäischen Union im Bereich Sicherheits- und Verteidigungspolitik in Brüssel an. Michael DAXNER

Professor Dr. Michael Daxner (Austria) holds a Dr. phil. from Vienna University. Additionally he received a Dr. of Humane Letters at Towson University, USA in 1990 and a Dr. Honoris Causa at the State University of Novosibirsk, Russia, in 1995.

Daxner started his career in the Federal Ministry of Science and Research in Vienna in 1970. 1974 he became Professor of Higher Education at the University of Osnabrück (Germany). 1986-1988 he was Elected President of the Carl von Ossietzky University in Oldenburg (Germany). Several memberships in various senates, university boards or commissions followed. In 1995 Prof. Daxner joined the International Association of University Presidents (IAUP). Since 1998 he is a Professor of Sociology at the University of Oldenburg.

From 2000 to 2002 he joined the UN Mission in Kosovo (UNMIK) as a Principal International Officer within the Ministry of Education, Science and Technology of the Provisional Self-Government in Kosovo. In May 2002, he became Special Counsellor to the UNMIK Office in Belgrade. From March 2003 to July 2004 he contributed to the Afghan Higher

Education Reform, commissioned by German Rectors and German Academic Exchange on behalf of the German Foreign Office.

Jasteena DHILLON

Jasteena Dhillon (Canada and UK) has focused on legal issues in Sri Lanka, Afghanistan, Pakistan, Indonesia, Palestine and the Balkans. She trained lawyers and judges who work with refugees and internally displaced persons (IDP's). 2006/07 she has been retained by the Norwegian Refugee Council to manage, train and advise lawyers and judges in their work with conflict and Tsunami affected internally displaced persons in Sri Lanka.

After completing her Masters in Law at the Leiden University in the Netherlands on child soldiers and impunity in internal conflicts, Ms. Dhillon began her international legal career in the UN with UNRWA (United Nations Relief and Works Agency) for Palestinian Refugees in the Near East in Gaza. In Canada, she worked as a social worker. After completing her law degree, she worked with the Government of Ontario, representing child clients. She also worked for one year representing clients for Legal Assistance of Windsor, a legal clinic in Canada. She is also a part time lecturer in the degree programmes in Management and International Law and Economics and also International Non Governmental Organization Studies at the Management Centre Innsbruck, Austria.

Walter FEICHTINGER

Brigadier General Dr. Walter Feichtinger (Austria) started his military career in 1976 with the Officer's training at the Theresan Military Academy. From 1979 to 1998 he was field officer, armoured corps, in various functions. From 1993 to 1998 he was commander of the 10th Tank Battalion in St. Pölten. 1998 he graduated as Magister philosophiae, majoring in political sciences and journalism at the University of Vienna. From 1998 to 2001 he worked as deputy head of the Institute for Peace Support and Conflict Management of the National Defence Academy in Vienna (specialisation: Conflict Scenario Research). After that, he was called to the Federal Chancellery as security and defence political advi-

sor (2001-2002). Since 2002 he is head of the Institute for Peace Support and Conflict Management. In the same year he graduated as Doctor philosophiae.

Feichtinger is a member of the *Wissenschaftskommission* (Science Commission) of the Austrian MoD; the Commission for Cooperation between MoD and Austrian Academy of Sciences; the Board of the European Forum Alpbach and of IISS. He contributes to the Austrian ÖMZ (*Österreichische Militärische Zeitschrift*) Military Journal on a regular basis. He is editor of several books; numerous contributions and publications in the field of international crisis management (e.g. former Yugoslavia, Afghanistan and Iraq), security policy and development of conflict scenarios.

Markus GAUSTER

Markus Gauster (Austria) is a researcher at the Institute for Peace Support and Conflict Management at the National Defence Academy in Vienna and a reserve officer of the Austrian Armed Forces. He holds a Masters degree in law (Mag. jur.) from the University of Vienna and completed a postgraduate-course in journalism at the Danube University Krems, Austria. Before his engagement at the National Defence Academy in 2004 he worked among other things as a journalist.

Within the ICRC, he held the following positions: Delegate: Peru & El Salvador (1984-1986); Head sub-Delegation: Peru, Nicaragua & Sudan (1986-1990); Chief of Task Force: Horn of Africa & South Caucasus, Geneva (1990-1993); Head of Delegation: Azerbaijan, Rwanda & Afghanistan (1994-1998); Head of HR Recruitment Unit, Geneva (1998-2001); Advisor: training programs for ICRC senior staff, Geneva (2001-2002); Head of Operations for Central & South Asia, Geneva (since 2003; covering Central Asia and New Delhi regional delegations and Afghanistan, Pakistan, Nepal and Sri Lanka country delegations).

Karin KNEISSL

Since 1998, Dr. Karin Kneissl (Austria) works as independent scholar and correspondent. She is a Research Faculty Member at Webster University in Vienna and teaches international relations at universities in Lebanon and others. Her research and teaching focus covers political and energy issues in the Middle East; in this area she wrote various publications. Her recent book, "The Energy Poker" (in German), was published in Munich 2006.

From 1990 to 1998 Karin Kneissl worked for the Austrian Federal Ministry for Foreign Affairs. She had posts in the Political Section, in the Cabinet of the Minister, and in the Office of the Legal Advisor. Her diplomatic posts brought her to Paris and Madrid; moreover she was engaged in missions to Geneva and Brussels.

Dr. Michael Pohly (Germany) served as an observer from the United Nations for the "emergency loya jirga" in 2002 in central Afghanistan. In cooperation with the German Foreign Ministry and the UN, he has been reorganising democratic groups in Afghanistan since 1998. Since 1998 he acts as an adviser for the German Foreign Office, and was an observer during the Petersberg Conference in 2001. Dr. Pohly was involved in several medical and humanitarian projects in Afghanistan since 1978. His field studies cover Afghanistan, Pakistan, Mongolia, and Turkey.

In 1985, Michael Pohly got his MA in Social Anthropology, Politics, Journalism, and Economics at the Free University of Berlin. He finished his studies of medicine in 1989, when he became assistant at the Institute of Iranistics at the Free University. Additionally, he worked as a physician at the Benjamin-Franklin-Hospital (FU-Berlin). After becoming an internist in 1996, he is a lecturer at the Institute of Iranistics since 1998. Michael G. SCHMUNK

Ambassador Michael G. Schmunk (Germany) is a career diplomat and currently Germany's Ambassador to Bosnia and Herzegovina (Sarajevo). From 2005 to late summer 2006, he served as a Senior Fellow at Harvard University's "Weatherhead Center for International Affairs". From 2004 to 2005, he was a Senior Research Fellow/Visiting Diplomat in Residence at the "Stiftung Wissenschaft und Politik" (SWP Berlin), Berlin. From 2002-2004, he was Ambassador at large and Special Envoy for Afghanistan at the German Foreign Office in Berlin, where he was responsible for the "Bonn Process" and the development of the German model of the "Provincial Reconstruction Teams (PRTs)".

His fields of practical experience and research include Peace-, Nationand State-Building (PNSB) in post-conflict societies (concepts; structures; instruments; tools; principal PNSB building blocks); civil-military cooperation in the field of stabilization and reconstruction; states-at-risk; weak and failing states; Western Balkans; Afghanistan, Iraq; South Cau-

casus; South Africa. While at Harvard, he pursued research on the establishment of a "Joint Transatlantic Nation-Building Task Force". Schmunk recently published several articles and studies on the PRT concept and the future of civil-military cooperation.

Andreas SCHNEIDER

Diplom-Laotist Dr. phil. Andreas Schneider (Deutschland) ist seit 2005 Regionaldirektor des deutschen Entwicklungsdienstes (DED) für Afghanistan und Zentralasien mit Dienstsitz in Kabul. Er ist verantwortlich für alle Programme und Projekte in Afghanistan, Tadschikistan, Usbekistan und Kasachstan sowie die Personalvertretung für ca. 50 Entwicklungshelfer und Friedensfachkräfte sowie mehr als 50 einheimische Experten und Ortskräfte. Davor war er u.a. Leiter des DED-Referates Sonderprogramme (Afghanistan, Zentralasien, Palästinensische Gebiete, Naher Osten) sowie stv. Leiter des DED-Asienreferates.

1994 bis 1999 war er wissenschaftlicher Mitarbeiter am Institut für Asien- und Afrikawissenschaften der Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin sowie entwicklungspolitischer Gutachter, Trainer und Dolmetscher. Er betrieb unter anderem Forschungen zur Geschichte Laos bzw. Indochinas.

Gerald STÖTER

Diplom-Verwaltungswirt Gerald Stöter (Germany) has a profession as senior police officer and is working for the Council secretariat of the European Union within the Civilian Planning and Conduct Capability on the EU mission EUPOL Afghanistan. Before that he was the deputy head of the German Police Project (GPPO) in Kabul, Afghanistan for more than one year in 2006/2007. From 2000 to 2006 he worked as a deputy director at the Police College Aschersleben in Saxony-Anhalt/ Germany. Earlier, he headed the department for field police tasks at the Police department Halberstadt (1998-2000). At the Police department Magdeburg he was head of the department for intervention tasks (1997-1998). From 1991 to 1997 he acted as head of unit for immediate tasks in the Ministry of Interior in Saxony Anhalt.
