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Miklós Sárközy studied Iranian studies, classical languages, and history and defended his PhD in 2008 at the Eötvös Loránd University of Budapest on the early Islamic history of Tabaristan. He became the research fellow of the Institute of Ismaili Studies of London in 2013 where he spent three years. His publications focus on early Nizari Ismaili history, the history of Northern Iran, Ismaili manuscript studies in Central Asia and Iran, Persian historiography. Currently he is an associate professor of the Károli Gáspár University of the Reformed Church in Hungary and the guest lecturer of the Pázmány Péter Catholic University of Hungary. He is also a member of the Advisory Board of the *Encyclopaedia Iranica*.

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
