Das TRUPPENDIENST-Spezial „Militär International 2014“ widmet sich den Streitkräften der Vereinigten Staaten von Amerika und Kanadas. Militär International stellt auf Basis offener Quellen die Struktur der Streitkräfte unter Berücksichtigung der Reorganisationsmaßnahmen dar.

Die Streitkräfte der USA sind grundsätzlich den Unified Commands - dem Unified Command Plan folgend - unterstellt. Nach der Auflösung des U.S. Joint Forces Commands verbleiben neun solcher Kommanden, welche teilstreitkräfteübergreifend (Joint) organisiert sind. Folglich hat die regionale oder funktionale Zuordnung zu diesen Oberkommanden eine große Aussagekraft, die über die reine Zuordnung von Truppen zu den vier Teilstreitkräften hinausgeht. Es werden in gewohnter Weise die Teilstreitkräfte mit ihren Verbänden sowie die Anzahl der vorhandenen Waffensysteme dargestellt, während bei den Truppen der Unified Commands die Kräfte in ihren funktionalen oder geografischen Zuordnungen aufgelistet sind.

Es werden, wenn verfügbar, immer die Bezeichnungen der Truppen angeführt, um auch nach einer eventuellen Umgliederung oder Änderung der Unterstellungsverhältnisse rasch die Zuordnung der Truppen zu ermöglichen. Die Truppen werden grundsätzlich mit ihrer Originalbezeichnung angeführt und nicht nur numerisch aufgelistet, was keine Unterscheidung ermöglichen würde. Der Tatsache, der vermehrten Einbeziehung der Nationalgarde und der Reserve in die Einsatzführung aller Teilstreitkräfte, wird durch die detaillierte Aufnahme dieser Kräfte in die Truppengliederung Rechnung getragen.

Eine Auflistung der Stationierung der U.S. Truppen in den einzelnen Ländern kann der beiliegenden Karte entnommen werden. Bei den Großverbänden werden, wo immer möglich die Stationierungsorte angeführt.

Sowohl für die Streitkräfte der USA als auch für jene Kanadas ist zu berücksichtigen, dass sie für den Einsatz außerhalb des Heimatlandes optimiert sind. Reorganisationsmaßnahmen in Folge der Budgetkürzungen in den USA haben weitreichende Folgen für die Organisation und Ausstattung der Streitkräfte.

Kommandostruktur der U.S. Streitkräfte:

Der U.S. Präsident ist der Oberkommandierende über alle U.S. Streitkräfte, während der Verteidigungsminister primär die administrative Kontrolle ausübt. Der Nationale Sicherheitsrat (NSC), der grundsätzlich aus dem Vize-Präsidenten, dem Außenminister, dem Finanzminister, dem Verteidigungsminister, dem Director of National Intelligence, dem Sicherheitsberater des Präsidenten sowie dem „Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff“ besteht, berät den Präsidenten. Die Ministerien für die Teilstreitkräfte („Department of the Army“, „Department of the Air Force“, „Department of the Navy“, das auch die Angelegenheiten des U.S. Marine Corps wahrnimmt) unterstehen dem Verteidigungsminister. Neben der generellen Unterteilung der Teilstreitkräfte (U.S. Army, U.S. Navy, U.S. Air Force und U.S. Marine Corps) sind die U.S. Streitkräfte in strategische und konventionelle Kräfte geteilt. Die strategischen Kräfte umfassen alle ICBM, SLBM, Bomber, Luftverteidigungssysteme und Überwachungssysteme. Die konventionellen Kräfte inkludieren alle Kräfte für nichtnukleare Aufgaben. Die Befehlskette beginnt beim U.S. Präsidenten und reicht über den Verteidigungsminister zu den „Combatant Commanders“. Die „National Command Authority“ (NCA) wird durch den Präsidenten und den Verteidigungsminister wahrgenommen. Der Vorsitzende der „Joint Chiefs of Staff“ ist in die Befehlskette insofern integriert, als er Aufträge des Ministers und des Präsidenten an die „Combatant Commanders“ übermittelt, er hat aber keine Befehlsgewalt über deren Kräfte, ist vielmehr das Bindeglied zwischen den „Combatant Commanders“ und der „NCA“. Die Minister der Teilstreitkräfte stehen außerhalb dieser Befehlskette.

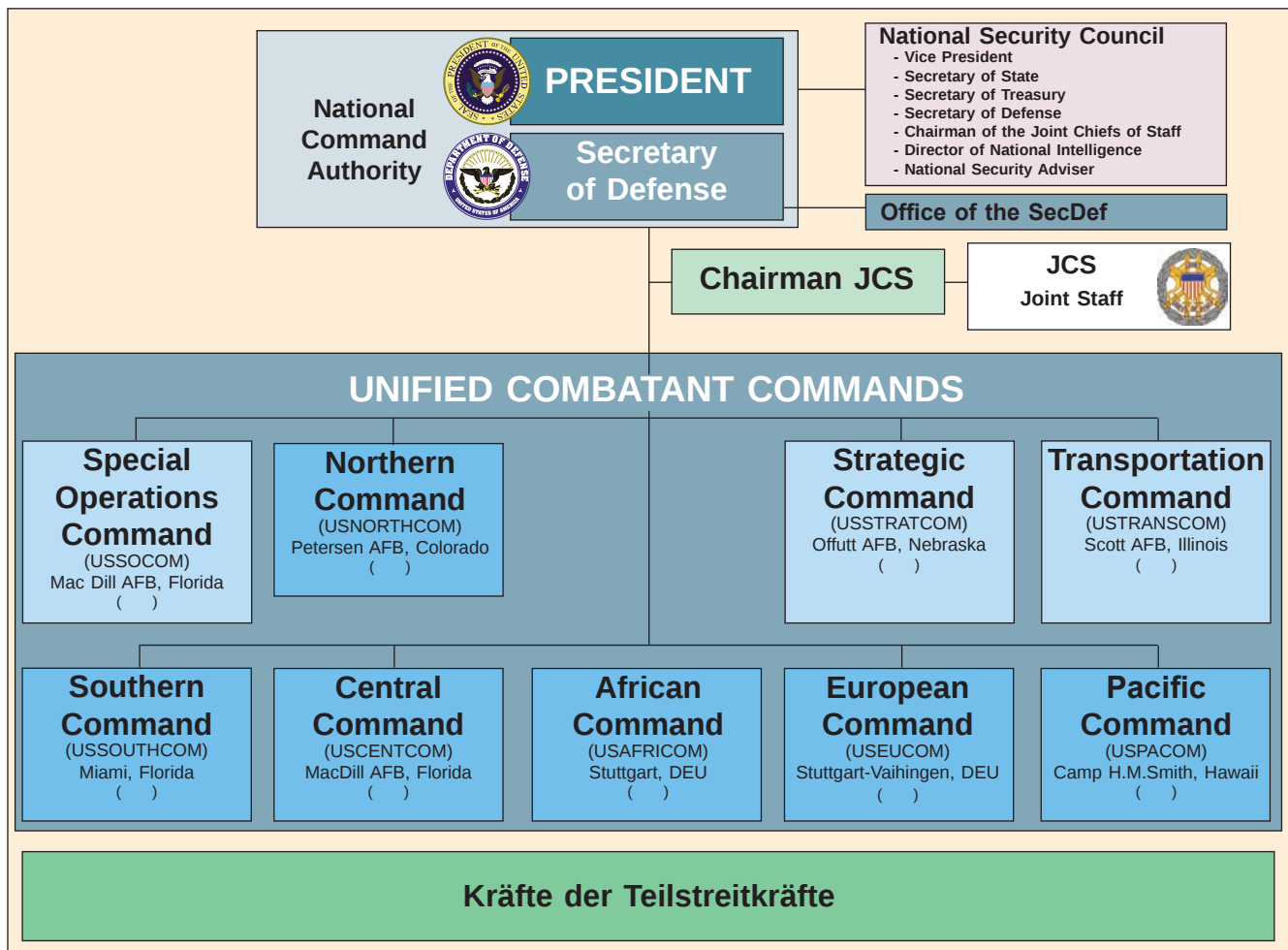

Der Chief of Staff U.S. Army ist nicht Teil der operationellen Befehlsskette, da die Truppen für den Einsatz den geografisch verantwortlichen „Unified Commands“ oder den mit speziellen Aufgabengebieten versehenen Functional Commands zugeordnet sind. Die Nationalgarde besteht in allen 50 U.S.-Bundesstaaten, den drei Territorien und im District of Columbia. Der Gouverneur des jeweiligen Bundesstaates führt die Nationalgarde. Er bedient sich dabei des Adjutant General (AG). In Friedenszeiten hat der Gouverneur, das in der Konstitution festgehaltene Recht, die Nationalgarde in seinem Bereich zur Katastrophenhilfe oder Unterstützung anderer Einrichtungen des Bundesstaates (z.B. zu Law Enforcement-Zwecken) aufzubieten. Der US-Präsident hingegen mobilisiert die Nationalgarde für Einsätze im Rahmen gesamtstaatlicher militärischer Einsätze.

Der Gouverneur des Bundesstaates ernennt den AG (außer in Vermont und South Carolina, dort wird er durch Wahl bestimmt). Er ist ausschließlich dem Gouverneur und nicht dem Department of Defense verantwortlich. Der Adjutant General ist ein Zwei-Sterne-General, der für die Mobilmachung und Einsatzbereitschaft der Verbände der Nationalgarde im Bereich seines Bundesstaates verantwortlich ist. Das State Area Command (STARC) ist das mobilmachungs-verantwortliche Kommando in jedem der US-Bundesstaaten. Es ist auch für die Planung und Führung von Einsätzen in Katastrophenfällen verantwortlich. Wenn ARNG-Verbände in den Bundesdienst gerufen werden, tritt das „National Guard Bureau“ mit seinem „Chief“ in Funktion. Der AG bleibt weiter für die übrigen ARNG-Verbände verantwortlich.

Die Army Reserve wird durch den „Chief of Army Reserve“ mithilfe seiner „Offices“ geführt. Er ist gleichzeitig Kommandierender General des U.S. Army Reserve Command.

Innerhalb der Ready Reserve gibt es Angehörige der Selected Reserve (ca. 211 000 Soldaten). Sie üben regelmäßig, sind konkreten Einheiten zugeordnet und verfügen über volles Material und Ausrüstung.

Die Individual Ready Reserve (ca. 116 000 Soldaten) umfasst frühere aktive Angehörige der Army, die mindestens acht Jahre Militärdienst abgeleistet haben. Sie sind keinen Einheiten zugeordnet, können aber freiwillig üben. Sie können im Kriegs- oder Notfall einberufen werden.

Inactive National Guard (ING) umfasst alle jene Soldaten, die Einheiten zugeordnet sind, jedoch keine Übungen durchführen. Auch die ING kann im Kriegs- und Notfall einberufen werden. Die Standby Reserve umfasst ca. 700 Soldaten, die zwar nicht in der Selected Reserve sind, jedoch „Key Civilian Employees“ sind, eine zeitweilige Einschränkung haben bzw. bei denen es sich um Härtefälle handelt.

Retired Reserve (ca. 731 000) umfasst frühere Angehörige der Streitkräfte, die im Ruhestand sind. Sie werden im Kriegs- oder Notfall aufgeboden.

Der Chief of Naval Operations (CNO) ist der ranghöchste Offizier in den Reihen der U.S. Navy. Dieser Vier-Sterne-General ist dem Secretary of the Navy für die Führung der Kräfte und Nutzung der verfügbaren Ressourcen der Navy verantwortlich. Als Mitglied des Joint Chiefs of Staff ist er der erste Berater des Präsidenten und des Secretary of the Navy in Fragen der Seekriegsführung. Er wird dabei durch den Vice Chief of Naval Operations, die Deputy Chiefs of Naval Operations und andere hochrangige Offiziere unterstützt, die im Office des Chief of Naval Operations (OpNav) zusammengefasst sind.

Die Seestreitkräfte werden nach den Grundsätzen des „Unified Command Plans“ eingesetzt. Die Kräfte der U.S. Navy, die sich im Verantwortungsbereich eines Unified Commands befinden, sind diesem OPCON unterstellt. Ein Navy-Offizier führt dort das Maritime-Component-Command.

Die Kommandanten der seegestützten Komponente der U.S. Navy („The Fleet“) folgen dennoch immer einer doppelten Befehlskette. Im Bereich der Ausbildung und Ausstattung der Kräfte sind sie dem CNO verantwortlich, während sie in einsatzrelevanten Bereichen dem Unified Combatant Commander unterstehen, in dessen Verantwortungsbereich sie sich befinden. Der Fleet Forces Commander, der zugleich der Commander U.S. Atlantic Fleet ist, ist für die Ausbildung jener Teile der Pazifik- und Atlantik-Flotte verantwortlich, die sich nicht im Einsatz in Übersee befinden (Inter-Deployment-Phase). Im Verantwortungsbereich eines Maritime Component Commands werden die Kräfte den Flotten zugeordnet. Zusätzlich existiert noch eine administrative Befehlskette, in der die Kapitäne dem jeweiligen Type-Commander (für eine spezielle Schiffstypen z. B. Zerstörer Typ Arleigh Burke) unterstehen.

Das USMC wird durch seinen „Commandant“ geführt. Die Kräfte des USMC bestehen aus den Marine Corps Forces (MARFOR), den Marine Corps Security Forces (MCSF), die Schutz für Einrichtungen der Navy gewährleisten und den Marine Security Guard Detachments, die Botschaften rund um die Welt schützen. Bei jedem regional verantwortlichen Kommando befindet sich ein Marine Component Command.

Das USMC ist grundsätzlich in Divisionen organisiert, kämpft aber in Formationen, die für den Expeditionseinsatz geschaffen sind: das sind die Marine Expeditionary Units (MEU), Marine Expeditionary Brigades (MEB) und die Marine Expeditionary Forces (MEF).

MEU, MEB und MEF umfassen jeweils ein Ground Combat Element (GCE), ein Aviation Combat Element (ACE) und ein Marine Logistics Element, welches die Versorgung sicherzustellen hat.

Die MEF umfasst 50 000 - 60 000 Soldaten: eine Marineinfanteriedivision, ein Marine Air Wing (gemischtes Geschwader), eine Force Service Support Group und ein Kommando.

In einer MEB sind etwa 14 000 - 18 000 Marines zusammengefasst. Den Kern der Ground Combat Elemente bildet ein Regiment, das abhängig von der Aufgabe mit Artillerie, Kampfpanzern, LAV, Pionieren und amphibischen Landungsfahrzeugen verstärkt wird. Mit diesen Teilen können vier Bataillionskampfgruppen gebildet werden, die von vier bis sechs Flieger- bzw. Hubschrauberstaffeln unterstützt werden.

MEUs werden regelmäßig im Rahmen vom Amphibious Ready Groups (ARG) oder Expeditionary Strike Groups (ESG) auf See stationiert. Sie umfassen etwa 2 200 Soldaten. Eine MEU bildet sich um ein verstärktes Marineinfanteriebataillon, eine

gemischte Hubschrauberstaffel und sechs Kampfflugzeuge vom Typ „Harrier“ sowie ein Logistics Combat Element. Eine MEU befindet sich üblicherweise an Bord eines LHA/LHD, eines LPD und eines LSD.

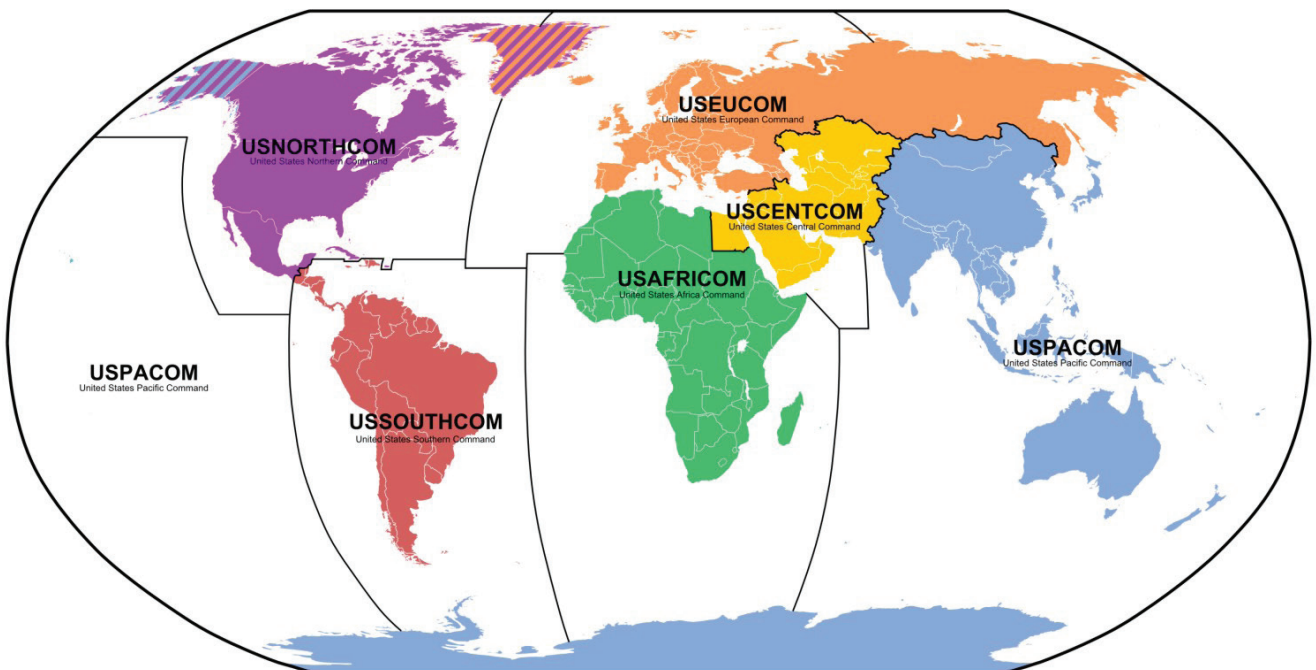

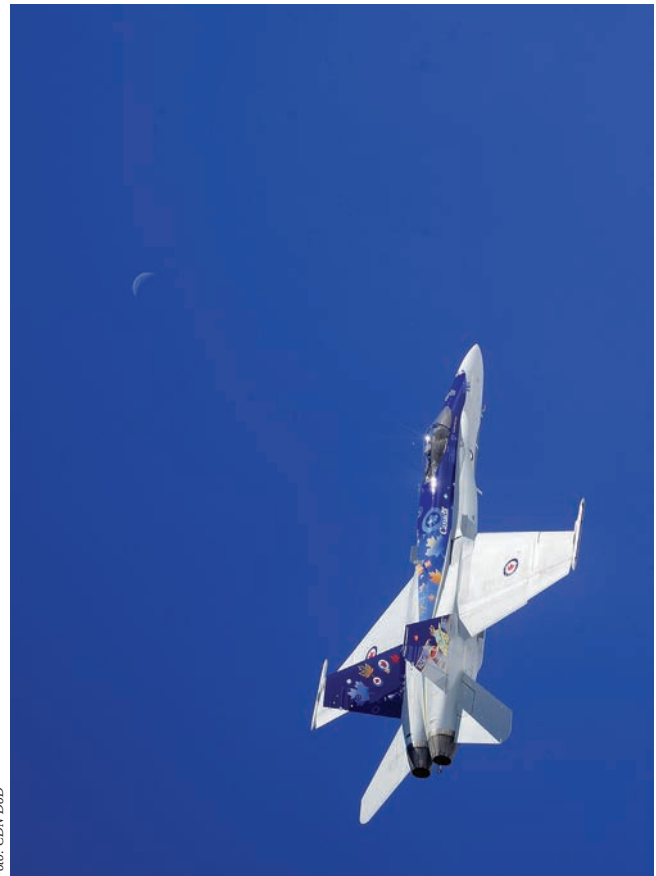
